SCHOOL NEWS: School Newsletter

As part of our strategic planning for the next four years, as a school we want to ensure that all parents and guardians are kept better informed on what their children are learning. Therefore, the staff have decided that at the beginning of each term, both Mr Kroll and Miss Lane will publish a class overview outlining the components of the Australian Curriculum students are learning across all curriculum learning areas. Specialist taught subjects will also be included as well.

A brief outline of what the students have learnt over the semester will also be included in the end of semester report cards. End of semester report

cards are sent home at the end of each semester. in terms two and four and consist of an effort and achievement rating for each learning area, as well as a behaviour and overall comment. Other than the Australian Curriculum, the other major document that underpins everything that we do in relation to what we teach at school is the P-12 CARF. The P-12 curriculum, assessment and reporting framework (P-12 Framework) specifies the curriculum, assessment and

reporting requirements for all

Queensland state schools' principals and staff delivering the curriculum from Prep to Year 12. It clearly states how

often each learning area needs to be taught, assessed and reported on. In the past we have reported on each learning area twice a year, which is more than the CARF states that is required. Hence,

after careful collaboration amongst staff, it has been decided that from now on subjects will only be reported on

as required. Please note though, while each subject may not be shown on a report card each semester, the subject itself will still be taught throughout the year, though not always formally assessed and reported upon. If you would like further details around this please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher to discuss.

Finally, last year both classes decided to adopt the P-6 Curriculum Planning Model for teaching English and Mathematics. This model suits the context of our school and the dynamics of our classroom environments, in that rather trying to teach separate units of work for each year level, the P-6 model allows for the teaching of one unit which is then adjusted to meet the curriculum and reporting requirements for each term. I personally have seen the benefits in the senior classroom, as it allows students to move

from group to group with ease when requiring support or extension in their learning journey.

P-2 Classroom

This term the Prep- 2 students have been focussing on fairy tales and traditional tales for our English unit. We

have been exploring and comparing a variety of texts over these last few weeks. Some of the texts we have been analysing include Jack and the Beanstalk, Little Red Riding Hood, How the Birds Got Their Colours and The Tiny Samurai. The students have been able to broaden their knowledge and understanding of different cultures throughout this unit.

We have been continuing on with the Sounds Write Program every morning to focus on the students spelling and reading skills. We are also in the process of adopting the Story Champs program to enhance the student's vocabulary and comprehension skills.

In Maths, the students have been working on place value and number as well as exploring the concept of time. We have been looking at days of the weeks, months of the year, seasons, reading and representing time on both digital and analogue clocks and sequencing events in chronological order.

In HASS this semester, the students have been exploring maps and places and how we are connected to particular places.

In Science, the students are using their senses to explore and observe the weather in their local environment and learn that we can record our observations using symbols. In addition to the weather, the year 1's and 2's are studying Earth's resources and exploring how they are used and more importantly what can be done to conserve them for future generations.

3-6 Classroom ENGLISH

This term in English, the students are experiencing reading and analysing traditional stories from Asia and from Aboriginal peoples' and Torres Strait Islander peoples' histories and cultures. So far, this term with Miss Heit they have covered the Dreamtime stories "The rainbow serpent", "Tiddalick the frog" and "The frog and the brolga". To demonstrate their

understanding of the stories, students unpack these stories by identifying structural and language features, finding literal and inferred meaning and explaining the message or moral. At the end of the unit, students will plan, create and present a traditional story which includes a moral for a younger audience.

MATHEMATICS

This term in Mathematics, the students are covering the three sub strands: Number and Algebra, Measurement and Chance. In number and algebra, the year 3's have been mainly focusing on addi-

tion and subtraction problems and how to use various strategies to solve simple and complex problems. The year 4's in comparison are learning strategies to solve multiplica-

tion and division problems, with an emphasis on the 2, 3,

4, 5, 6, 9 and 10 timetables. Meanwhile, the year 5 and 6's will be learning further strategies to solve problems involv-

ing all four operations. The senior students will also explore dividing and multiplying using whole and part numbers involving fractions and or decimals.

Currently, the main focus of Mathematics this term has

been the measuring component involving time. The year 3's have been revising telling time at o'clock, half past and quarter to & past using both digital and analogue time. As this is often a difficult concept for students to comprehend, I strongly encourage families to talk with their children about telling time at home. The year 4's meanwhile, have revised telling time to a specific minute, and calculating how much time has occurred between two events. The year 5's have been exploring 24-

hour time and using it to solve various time problems.

The senior students have been learning to read and interpret timetables for travel purpose.

Finally, for chance, the students will participate in a range of chance experiment and investigations, to help determine the outcome of a specific choice. The older students will express outcomes using fractions and decimals while the junior students use correct chance and probability terminology.

SCIENCE

The 3's and 4's are exploring natural processes and human activities that cause weathering and erosion of Earth's surface. Students will relate this to their local surroundings, to make observations and predict consequences of future occurrences and human activity.

The 5's and 6's are exploring how sudden geological changes and extreme weather events can affect Earth's surface. They will consider the effects of earthquakes and volcanoes on Earth's surface and how communities are affected by these events. Furthermore, they will construct representations of cyclones and evaluate community and personal decisions related to preparation for natural disasters.

HASS

The 3's and 4's are drawing conclusions about how the identities and sense of belonging for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the past and present were and continue to be affected by British colonisation and the enactment of terra nullius. In addition, they will analyse the experiences of contact between Australia's First Peoples and others, and the effects these interactions had on people.

The 5's and 6's are exploring the following inquiry questions: What does it mean to be an Australian citizen? Throughout this unit, they will examine continuities and changes in the experiences of Australian democracy and citizenship, including the status and rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, women and children.

TECHNOLOGY

The senior class are continuing to grow a variety of vegetables and fruit around the school as part of their food production unit. Yesterday, Mrs Todd kindly donated a large number of strawberry runners, which the students planted out under the watch-

ful eye of Mr Stewart.

HEALTH and PHYSICAL EDUCATION

This term, all the students using fundamental movement skills and elements of movement to learn the different disciplines of athletics. This will prepare them for the upcoming athletics carnival in June. The students are very fortunate again this year as they are receiving weekly lessons from a national athletics coach, Des Davis.

WHOLE SCHOOL





LANGUAGES

Mrs Wyatt teaches AUSLAN to all the students on a Wednesday morning. Throughout this term, they are continuing to build up their Auslan vocabulary by learning to sign a range of terms and phrases.



THE ARTS

Across both classes, Ms Lane has organised an assortment of visual art projects for the students to complete. Many of these pieces will be entered into the Beaudesert Show later this year. Last week, Ms Lane and Miss Heit completed a 3D space piece with the senior class.



This term's focus in music will be on our formal assessment tasks for reporting. All students I see will be asked to Sing, Play Ukulele, Respond and compose music.

Year Prep/1/2 Group In term two students will work on our "Different places music unit" and work on creating our own lyrics and rhythm patterns. We will practice and develop our singing, playing and creative skills through the songs and games suggested in the Different Places Unit. Students will be assessed on active participation in music class lessons, simple rhythm composition activities (composing rhythms), singing and playing ukulele's in class (performing) and answering questions (responding) in class.

Year 3-4 Group

Our class will be working this year on an ongoing skills program and our "Songs of Australia" Music Unit. We will be spending quite a few weeks working on creating our own 4 bar song about an Australian animal using only the notes B, A & G. This task involves creating our own lyrics (words), thinking about and working out the rhythm patterns of our words, and adding simple melody patterns using only 3 notes. The advantage to 3 note melodies is that students will be able to play them on available classroom instruments such as recorder, ukuleles, xylophones or fifes. We will continue to develop our singing and ukulele playing skills. We will also have a go at singing a beautiful Aboriginal song Jingarti Jarpalinga by lan Ross Williams <u>https://youtu.be/WjMaNA_ous</u>

Year 5/6I group Students in our year 5/6 cohort will be spending this year working on our "Around the World Music Unit" with a focus on learning a repertoire of songs from countries around the world including Africa, America, Japan and discussing different instruments, different cultures and different ways that music is used to create and share cultures around the world. This term students will focus on creating a personal listening diary where they will write out some song analysis of 4 different songs in class, they will discuss, respond, think, analyse and compare music from different countries. Students will be assessed on composing, responding and performing tasks including singing and ukulele playing this semester. For one of these tasks

they may choose their absolute favourite song to write about, so long as it's school friendly, so parents please allow students to listen to a variety of music at home or share some of your

favourite musicians with them.

Students continue to improve their Rugby League skills and it is requested that students bring their head gear and mouthguards next week to start some tackling practice. We are keen to start this in the hope of organising and getting ready to play a trial match or two before the Kingfisher Cup in September.



CHAPPY NEWS

Our school chaplain, Chappy Don is at school every Wednesday. In the mornings, before school he operates a breakfast club out of the tuckshop. Students have the option between toast with various spreads, raisin toast and cereal. The cups of milo have proven popular with many of the students. Students are reminded to have breakfast club as soon as they arrive, because a number of students are going to have breakfast when the bell goes. For the rest of the day he works with students along side Ms B in the music room and Ms H in setting up and running PMP. PMP stands for perceptual motor program, which is a program designed

for younger children to develop their gross motor skills by participating in stations which develop throwing, catching, balance, bouncing, skipping, crawling to just name a few. Each Wednesday Chappy and Ms H will set up new stations which, Ms Lane will then use for the next week as part of morning fitness most days.

In the afternoon, Chappy spends his time working one on one with specific students. This time is used, to check in with the students, discuss emotions and feeling and play social games.
